


LEE CHILD'S JACK REACHER

Lee Child is the pen name of Jim Grant (b.1954), a British thriller writer known for the Jack Reacher novel series. The books follow the adventures of a former American military policeman, Jack Reacher, who wanders the United States. His first novel, *Killing Floor*, won the Anthony Award for Best First Novel.

He worked at Granada Television, part of the UK's ITV Network, from 1977 to 1995 and ended his career there with two years as a trade union shop steward. After being made redundant from his job due to corporate restructuring, Grant decided to start writing novels, stating they are "the purest form of entertainment." In 1997, his first novel, *Killing Floor*, was published, and he moved to the United States in the summer of 1998.

Some books in the Reacher series are written in first person, while others are written in the third person. Grant has characterized the books as revenge stories – "Somebody does a very bad thing, and Reacher takes revenge" – driven by his anger at the downsizing at Granada. Although English, he deliberately chose to write American-style thrillers.
